A Limited Reform Scenario Under Calderon

The glass is half empty, and the glass is half full. Analysi views on the political parentama facing Felipe Calderon when he takes office on Dec. 1 and to fall into two diverging carrips. Some doem his prosperts doemed by a weak mandate and a militarn opposition in Congress that refuses to recognize his authority. Others believe the advysmal showing by the cuntrist PRI in the elections will compel it to competate with the ruling PAN and deliver reforms that will modernize the economy and boost Calderon's public stature. We think it's a little of both. Calderon's reform glass may not be dry, but it doesn't contain a long, coal drink, either.

The half-empty, half-full divergence mirrors the all-or-nothing mentality surrounding meforms. Disappointment awaits observers hoping for a fiscal reform that wears federal coffers of oil townus and dramatically raises tax collection, for an energy reform that creates a modern Pemex at the cortion of ample private-sector alliances, or for a labor reform that trutoduces flexibility and officiencies true the marketplant.

But important gains may still be made. The administration of President Vicente Fox is generally said to have failed in its efforts to achieve fiscal reform. But if "reform" is taken to mean to an amendment or change for the better,

Somewhat Sustainable. Mexico fell to third in the 2006 edition of the annual ranking of Latin America's "ethics/sustainability," based on more than 50 metrics of mainly public sector performance that is designed by the Madrid-based agency Management & Excellence. "Mexico slipped behind Argentina this year despite having the best economic numbers and ambitious reforms in corporate governance, due to weaknesses in education and corruption," the report said. "Argentina benefits not only from the best educational performance, but from good numbers in human rights, political liberties, life expectancy and quality of life." The report attempts to assess an amalgam of economic, political, social, corruption, environmental and legal data across eight Latin American nations.
